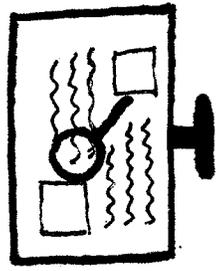

# A Critical Skill!

## SIFT Method

Developed by digital literacy expert, Mike Caulfield, to help decide if online content can be trusted as a credible or reliable source of information.

It helps you quickly evaluate a source by focusing your attention on what matters!

Before sharing an article, be aware of your emotions + response. Headlines rely on those to get clicks!

## Trace to the Original

Claims, quotes, + media may be cherry-picked to support biased claims. Attempt to find the original source by clicking source links/the bibliography.

Consider:

- Was the claim, quote, media represented fairly?
- Was it taken out of context?
- Was anything edited from the original?

## Investigate

Take a moment to look up the author + publishing source.

Consider:

- What can you find about the author?
- What's their mission? Do they have a conflict of interest?
- Do they have authority in that area?

Use lateral reading to see what trusted sources say about this source!

## Find Better Coverage

See if you can find other sources that support or dispute the original claim.

Consider:

- What coverage is available on the topic?
- Is there controversy around the topic?
- Are trusted sources reporting on it?
- Use a fact checker!
  - Factcheck.org
  - Snopes.com
